2019 At A Glance

IDVR Customers Served 10,158 customers. Customers by Disability Type are 4,884 Mental Health, 1,582 Physical, 67 Communicative, 1,909 Cognitive and 914 Sensory.

IDVR Customers by Age Range are ages 0 to 16 is 1,224, ages 17 to 18 is 1,867, ages 19 to 24 are 1,329, ages 25 to 44 is 3,082, ages 45 to 54 is 1,327, ages 55 to 59 is 592 and ages 60 years and older are 554.

Funds Expended on Training

The total funds expended on training is \$1,943,302.79. For Truck Driving is \$216,258, On-the-job training is \$50,949.75, Four year \$738,794.16, Community College \$174,298.48, Graduate is \$169,448.86 Occupational, Vocational is \$538,798.56, and miscellaneous is \$54,754.98.

1,032 Customers Successfully Employed

Customer wages increased 543% after receiving vocational rehabilitation services.

Top Wages Earned

Below are actual wages of Customers who went to work after receiving vocational rehabilitation services. Individual with disabilities possess the ability to earn high wages in professional positions. The following hourly wages Computer Programmers \$50.00, Postsecondary Education Administrators \$49.99, Public Administration, Chief Executives, Legislators \$45.16, Management Analyst \$42.79, Surveying and Mapping Technicians \$37.20.

Top Occupation Categories

The top five occupation categories start with Personal Care and Service with 301 customers. Production with 105, Transportation and Material moving with 88, Office and Administrative Support with 59 and Installation, Maintenance, and Report with 52 customers.

Business Engagement

IDVR assists Idaho businesses in hiring and retaining qualified employees IDVR's Business Engagement Team members are available in each region to address the needs of local Idaho businesses including providing technical assistance/training with accommodations on the job, connecting business with a relatively untapped and diverse labor pool, and help employers work with their employees with disabilities to keep or modify their job, or even training to help move to a new position.

HP Spectrum Success Program

Leveraging the talents of individuals on the Autism spectrum, the week-long cohort included tours of HP, team building activities, presentation skills workshop, social and writing workshops, informational interviews and interviewing techniques, and an overview of jobs.

Of the cohort participants, two were hired for summer internships, including one from Idaho. HP was so impressed with the outcome they anticipate another cohort beginning in January, 2020. IDVR will continue to provide support and technical assistance to the program.

Chad, Orofino Idaho SJX Jet Boats

Chad is a Jet Boat Welder at SJX Jet Boats. His supervisor Steve Stajkowski comment "With Chad it's been nothing less than a perfect fit. He wants to come to work. He's excited to come to work. and we are excited to have him."

Jeff, Grangeville Idaho Grangeville Senior Center

Jeff is a Cook at Grangeville Senior Center. His supervisor Molly Mizer comment Jeff came to work for us a little over a year ago and he fit right in. And he's a darn good cook. He's learned to cook everything from meatloaf to casseroles to chicken."

Pre-Employment Transition Services Pre-ETS

IDVR Student Served

IDVR served 3,155 students and spent a total of \$2,937,732.43 of program funds. IDVR continues to provide valuable Pre-Employment Transition Services abbreviated as Pre-ETS, to students with disabilities around the state.

A focus of Pre-ETS is the paid summer work experiences. Over 340 students participated in one week of job skills training, followed by five weeks of paid work with businesses in 15 different areas around the state; additional on the job work training was provided to students when needed. In addition, 35 students who are deaf or hard of hearing from around the state participated in job skills training followed by four weeks of paid work experience in their local community. Employers continue to express the value of this program and assisting students to learn on the job. Selkirk Outdoor Leadership and Education Program (SOLE) For the past three years SOLE has partnered with the Lake Pend Oreille School District and IDVR to encourage students to take leadership roles and provide a safe space to push through personal challenges. This Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, abbreviated as STEM, focused program teaches students leadership skills while also highlighting high demand employment opportunities specifically in forestry and conservation.

Boise State Postsecondary Rewarding Educations is Possible (PREP) Academy

Students who participate in the PREP Academy learn college skills through participation in course presentations, career development activities including career pathways, in-demand industry needs, independent living skills, financial literacy instruction, and developing next steps for students on their path to postsecondary education.

Boise School District Summer School Work Program Boise School District students had the opportunity to participate in work readiness training and a short paid work experience during summer school, while earning academic credit. Students completed their coursework through a combination of in-class work and paid work experience on the job with a local employer. Students learned academic and work skills needed to be successful on the job.

SRC continues to provide input on IDVR activities throughout the year and during the SRC quarterly meetings.

SRC provided input on the Customer Satisfaction Surveys in order to improve feedback that can assist IDVR in meeting their goals. IDVR Funding

The Idaho Division of Vocational Rehabilitation receives 78.7 percent of its funding through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. For Federal fiscal year 2019, U.S. Department of Education awarded total federal grant funds of \$17,263,470. The State of Idaho funded the remaining 21.3 percent of the costs at \$4,672,324.
